The Right Hills to Die On

Because we live in a world populated with self-interested sinners, conflict and warfare will be an ancillary characteristic of our existence. And, since the beginning of warfare, military strategists have been confronted with the difficult job of sending soldiers to die to conquer or protect significant positions. Generally, hills are strategically important. When deciding to attack or defend a hill, the general must consider if the strategic value of the hill is worth the potential number of casualties his force may incur in the battle. In other words, the general must decide which hill is the right hill to die on. The right hill to die on is the hill

which is so critical to the overall mission that no sacrifice is too great to take or defend it.

In the 21st century, culture and politics are encroaching on commonly held Christian "hills." Although we are not in a campaign with guns and tanks trying to take or defend an actual hill, nevertheless, believers are in a position of deciding which is the right hill to die on.

Do not misunderstand. There will be casualties. It's unlikely that lives will be lost, but the mortality rate may include long-cherished friendships and possibly close family relationships. With a cost this high, one must be sure that the hill upon which he is willing to die is the right hill.

I suggest that the right hill to die on is one that:

- **Is Biblically Nonnegotiable** – There is a difference between Christian liberty and nonnegotiable truth. If you worship on Sunday, and I worship on Thursday, each day is biblically permissible (Rom. 14:5; Col. 2:16-17). Areas of Christian liberty are not hills to die on. This is the very point Paul makes in Romans and 1 Corinthians 8. But there are some issues that are nonnegotiable. These are areas where Scripture speaks with clarity. For example, sexual immorality of any kind (e.g., sex before marriage, homosexuality, adultery, etc.) are nonnegotiable hills to die on. No

matter how acceptable it may be culturally, believers cannot compromise on these kinds of issues.

- **Is Reasonable in Scope** – The imposition of Christian behavior should remain on those who profess to be Christians. In 1 Corinthians 5, Paul says, "I wrote you in my letter not to associate with immoral people; I did not at all mean with the immoral people of this world...but actually, I wrote to you not to associate with any so-called brother if

he is an immoral person...not even to eat with such a one" (vv. 9-11). Christians cannot expect Christian behavior from those who

do not claim to be Christians. However, the Bible never implies that believers are to be silent in the public arena (Mt. 5:13-16; Phil. 2:14-15). It is important to remember that while taking a stand and standing firm, we do not shun individuals with whom we want to share the hope of the gospel. Truth, no matter how offensive, will set people free (Jn. 8:32), but our actions and attitudes should always adorn the truth with dignity in every respect (Titus 2:10).

- **Is Necessary for God's Glory** – Believers are commanded to glorify God in everything we do (1 Cor. 10:31). Therefore, the right hill to die on is the hill that impacts our ability to glorify God. Paul said, regarding Christian liberty, "The faith which you have, have as your own conviction before God. Happy is he who does not condemn himself in what he approves" (Rom. 14:22). In our practice of Christian liberty, we must make distinctions between those things that condemn (i.e., the practice or approval of anything clearly stated in Scripture as something God opposes), and those things that adorn the doctrine of God in every respect.

Not every issue is a hill to die on. Some are better left alone. But when an issue arises that is a hill, don't be afraid to stand firm in the faith (1 Cor. 16:13), and give your account with gentleness and reverence (1 Pet. 3:15).

Do not misunderstand. There will be casualties. It's unlikely that lives will be lost, but the mortality rate may include long-cherished friendships and possibly close family relationships.

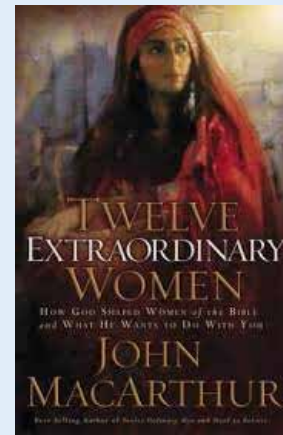

Tending the Flock

Pursue Complete Understanding

Last month in “Tending the Flock” Elder Jon Recker reminded us that Sunday School was not just for kids. This led me to reflect – I can remember being in Sunday School here at BPC in elementary, junior, and even high school.

It’s embarrassing to admit, but after I “graduated” from high school Sunday School, I subconsciously felt like I knew the Bible quite well - probably 80 % of the important stuff and likely 98 % of the super important stuff. And my self-awarded 80 % was a pretty good card to play in the spiritual comparison game. It took me a couple of years before I came to the sheepish realization of how naïve and/or arrogant that subconscious thinking was.

Then I had kids, and slowly began to realize it might be more accurate to say that my 80 % was probably more like 1/80 % or less.

Of course, I am not encouraging anyone to develop made-up score card numbers like I did. I am encouraging you today to pursue a deeper understanding of Scripture than you had yesterday. It will bring glory to God and blessing to you. Imagine the blessing it was for me when I started to grasp with one hand that, “if you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved” (Rom. 10:9) along with, “In love He predestined us to adoption as sons through Jesus Christ to Himself” (Eph 1:5). How much better would it have been if I had known to hold on to Ephesians 1:5 as a young elementary kid, instead of doubting late at night and wondering if I had said “the prayer of salvation” just right when younger? A proper understanding of the doctrine of salvation is not foremost an academic endeavor. More importantly, it is a sure anchor during life’s storms for one who

has surrendered his or her will to Christ.

A few weeks ago during Sunday School, we studied in Luke 24 the encounter of the two disciples with the resurrected Christ on the road to Emmaus. These disciples were distraught and doubting. Like me, they did not have a proper grasp of the revealed Word of God. In their situation, they believed in the Messiah and that He would establish His kingdom on earth, but they ignored the evidence in the Old Testament that this Messiah must first suffer as the Lamb of God. They were right, but their thinking was incomplete. When their incomplete understanding of Scripture met with reality, it led to their distress. Their understanding was incomplete because they didn’t pay attention to *all* of the Old Testament scripture – just the 80 % they and the Jewish culture thought was important.

We know they had ample evidence because Jesus did not give them participation trophies for being disciples who missed the whole point of His work on earth. Rather He compassionately let them know why and where they missed the mark: “O foolish men and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary for the Christ to suffer these things and enter into His glory?” (Luke 24:25,26). And then He compassionately explained to them, “beginning with Moses and with all the prophets the things concerning Himself” in *all* of the Old Testament scriptures (v. 27).

So, along with Jon, I want to invite you to check your bulletin and join us in Sunday School. Let’s encourage each other as we pursue together a more complete understanding of all of God’s Word, for His glory and our blessing.
